Keepers of Perth's Jewish History

To many in our community the Jewish Historical & Genealogical Society WA (JHGS-WA), is just another small group servicing a small number of members and does not contribute much to the broader community.

The JHGS-WA is the organisation that is keeping the history of the Jews of Perth and WA, the impact they have had on the Jewish community and the wider population of Perth.

Jews were among the first non-indigenous people to come to Perth. The Jewish community has, since those first Jews arrived, formed many organisations and groups to cater to their various needs and interests.

JHGS-WA is not only collecting and archiving the histories of existing organisations, it is seeking information held by members of the community of organisations that NO LONGER EXIST.

Earlier in the year, we contacted existing organisations, asking if they wished to facilitate themselves of the offer to professionally archive their histories. As a result, Michelle Urban, Jan Walters, with John Urban's help, and Sabrina Elias, Head Archivist from the Australian Jewish Historical Society (AJHS), spent several weeks going through the information held and selected the relevant historically significant information to be archived.

To date, we have received from Sabrina, a professionally compiled 57-page Significant Assessment Report (available to interested parties). The various organisations have now 'signed-off' their permission forms, and JHGS-WA are progressing to the next stage.

The work does not stop here. The fact that we are a thriving community means the work continues. This latest Project was made available through the help of a Lotterywest Grant and allowed us to hire through the auspices of the AJHS, Sabrina Elias, Head Archivist, who has been amazing, outstanding, exciting and thorough and we thank Peter Philippsohn for AJHS help.

WHO IS THE AJHS

Australian Jewish Historical Society

The AJHS was founded in 1938 in Sydney. The first president was Percy J. Marks. At the first business meeting of the Society, the then-president of the Royal Australian Historical Society K.R. Cramp expressed the view that the chief object of the Society should be the encouragement of individual research. In 1939, the Society published the first issue of the Australian Jewish Historical Society Journal. In 1949, a Melbourne branch was established, which was informally known as AJHS, Melbourne Victoria.

AJHS documents material on almost every aspect of **Jewish** life is available, such as genealogical information, personal papers, bound newspapers and institutional records sourced from individuals through to synagogues, communities and Jewish organisations.

In 1914, Rabbi David Freedman, who served as the Rabbi of Perth Hebrew Congregation in Western Australia, embarked on a journey that would etch his name in the annals of heroism.

Joining the ranks of the ANZAC forces, Rabbi Freedman carried with him a sacred mission and a symbol of faith – a small Sefer Torah gifted by the Jewish community of Alexandria, Egypt, where he had stopped during the arduous journey to Gallipoli.

The ancient Jewish community of that famous city wanted to show its appreciation for his and the Jewish soldiers' war effort and to do something to protect them. They gave him that small Sefer Torah, which he took and kept with him at all times.

How did I get here? Written by Christine Silbert. Available for \$35.00

Researching has turned grainy, old fashioned photos of places and people into living, breathing personalities. The tenacity the **Silberts** brought from a small town in the north of Poland (then Russia) to Australia in 1886, makes inspiring reading.

Instead of joining the goldrush to possibly make their fortune in Broken Hill and Kalgoorlie, **Abraham**, the first Australian **Silbert**, and business partner Joe Sharp had the boldness to develop a large merchant business. The extent of their entrepreneurship will surprise. In 1900, he brought out his two halfnephews, Solomon and Barney, who followed suit conducting numerous businesses.

The follow-on memoir of my life as a single woman making her way in business, and finding her place in the world, has some of the same hallmarks of risk and adventure.....constantly posing the question of: *How did I get here?*

WHY FORT WAYNE?
